Improvements Have Begun at the Monks Road Staging Area

You may have noticed the recent improvements made to the staging area. It has received \$17,000 worth of improvements that include a vault toilet and 600 tons of 23AA road gravel. In addition, the region was cleared back to enlarge our usable space and increase visibility from the road. It is hoped that a better view will decrease vandalism and destruction. Since it is an unsupervised area, the park manager is considering installing surveillance cameras and signs, which would be beneficial to equestrian users.

There was a significant amount of gravel spread that will take time to settle and harden. Eventually it will be like a road surface. Depending on how soft it is next spring, it is possible that the parking area will be blocked off until it hardens to protect it from getting rutted and costing more in repairs.

There is \$13,000 out of the \$30,000 grant funds left to spend on this area. \$8,000 of that is budgeted for the hand pump well to be installed next spring. The remainder will be spent on a mounting block, picket posts, gate and fence to the back field. There will be a meeting on site sometime after the qun season to discuss the added items we'd like to see installed.

We received a \$350 Michigan Horse Council (MHC) trail grant to construct a kiosk to replace the existing board. The new one will have a roof and watertight display case. If we end up constructing this with volunteer labor, it will be done over the winter for a spring install unless we have enough money to get one through the improvement monies. If that is the case, the board will decide whether or not to return the trail grant to MHC or apply it to other trail improvements.
